Past and Current GSWA Initiatives

Phosphorus Bylaw

- A restriction on the use of lawn fertilizers containing phosphorus on established lawns
- Eurasian Watermilfoil (EWM) abatement
 - A collaboration with the City of Greater Sudbury to reduce the invasive aquatic plant via weevil stocking

Annual Public Educational Events

• A collaboration with many partners





Eurasian Watermilfoil (EWM)

- EWM is in 18 Sudbury area lakes & spreading
- Three-year abatement project had some success
- Monitoring and collaboration continue.
- Education and awareness events continue.





Spiny Water Flea

- Identified in Lake Panache & Lake Nepahwin
- Eats up to three times as much food as other zooplankton & reproduce quickly
- Threatens food web & can disrupt water intakes
- No methods to eradicate it
- Prevention is key to stopping its spread

 Boat washing is effective at reducing the spread of both EWM and the Spiny Water Flea

Gogama Derailments, 2015 More than 1 million litres of crude oil and petroleum distillates leaked into waterways

- Climate Resilience:
 - Wetland protection to protect habitat and prevent flooding
 - Green Infrastructure to prevent flooding and reduce pollution reaching our waterways





- Wastewater and Stormwater Upgrades
 - Ending inflow and infiltration of stormwater into Wastewater Treatment Facilities
 - Ending bypassing of untreated & undertreated sewage into our lakes and rivers
