- 3. Adoption of Agenda. Moved by John Lindsay; seconded by Susan Darling. **CARRIED**
- 4. <u>GSWA Welcome and Introduction</u> Chair Denton welcomed all present, explained his role and commented on the busy year.

- **5.** <u>Minutes of Annual General Meeting of March 19, 2018</u>. Motion to approve by Elaine Porter; seconded by Lesley Flowers. **CARRIED**
- 6. <u>Matters Arising from Minutes</u> None raised.
- 7. Executive Report and Summary of Stewardships Activities and Accomplishments R. Denton reviewed slides showing the GSWA Mission, Vision and Values. He highlighted the past year's accomplishments: the successful Septic Social held May 3, 2018; development of an Email Guideline (attached); and the application to EcoAction Community Funding by the Aquatic Invasive Species Eurasian Water Milfoil Committee (AIS-EWM). He reviewed some advocacy efforts and noted that GSWA made key submissions on the Transportation Study, the Ramsey Lake Sub-watershed Study, the proposed Ferrochrome Smelter location, the Kingsway Entertainment Development and wrote letters opposing the plan to eliminate Ontario's Environmental Commissioner. He called on stewardship representatives for brief reports.
  - <u>Fairbank Lake</u> –Two annual newsletters, annual picnic, Zone Watch program, and Lake Trout Tagging Project. Install and remove channel markers & hazard markers. Signage for boat cleaning at Provincial Park and the marina. The lake is healthy and free of EWM.
  - <u>Grant Lake</u> Receives the EWM flowing from McFarlane and into Long Lake; struggles to control it. Harvesting is done so that waterfronts are usable.
  - <u>Junction Creek</u> Flows Garson to Lively. Has research, and projects such as garbage pick-up, and data collection to compare trends. Collaborates with experts and encourages student involvement. Willing to share excellent resources do contact. Events include a May Festival and Trout Release. JCS sells cloth bags as fundraiser.
  - <u>Long Lake</u> Education re EWM and Natural Shorelines, via newsletters, bulletins, website and Facebook page. LL Milfoil Mapping 2018 was a major project volunteer boat teams documented shape, size, and density of EWM beds using GPS units. Assistance from city and LL residents were key. Developed a digital map showing major beds so residents can avoid them. Completed the 2-year Love Your Lake shoreline improvement program. Communicates with ENDM re Gold Mine Reclamation project.
  - <u>Minnow Lake</u> Followed the CGS installation of large twin hydrodynamic storm water sediment separators. They are lobbying for removal of large sediment plumes and made presentations to the CGS, MOECC and DFO. They are concerned about road salt issues and consult regularly with Ramsey Lake Stewardship.
  - <u>McFarlane</u> –First lake to develop EWM and it continues as a major challenge. A privately owned boat launch, used by residents and the public, has changed hands. ML stewardship is working with the city to solve the problem of no public boat launch for residents.
  - <u>Nepahwin Lake</u> Deals with plenty of milfoil. Focussing on generating more interest in an expanded stewardship group.
  - Ramsey Lake Hoping for signage that reflects the indigenous name of the lake (Bitimitagamsing); also wants speed limit signs for boaters. Some submissions have been declined by the city. The immense parking lot of the KED is a concern due to much salt entering the RL watershed. Opposed the location of the Ferrochrome Smelter in Coniston. The group continues its rain garden demonstration project at the entrance to LU. In 2018 Ramsey had the largest blue-green algae reported to date. The Climate Change information night hosted recently was attended by several scientists.

- <u>Richard Lake</u> Milfoil remains its main concern; works with AIS-EWM. City mapped the lake 2018. Walleye stocking continues 2019. Uses website, Facebook and a newsletter. Works with two campgrounds on the lake, e.g. to get a boat washing station. A photo calendar was produced for all residents that had important environmental messages for healthy lakes. Recognition program for notable supporters.
- <u>Simon Lake</u> The ever-present algae is unsightly and foul smelling, a problem that originated with untreated sewage. Although the lake is unsuitable for swimming, fishing is safe. A request to CGS to buy a skimmer to remove the algae was declined. There is hope a biologist hired by the AA First Nation is interested in helping.
- <u>St. Charles Lake</u> –Eurasian Water Milfoil is denser in recent years. Working with AIS-EWM to get approval to stage a pilot project to test a control method.

AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES EURASION WATER MILFOIL COMMITTEE – Chair, Scott Darling Members include Nicole Wittke, Irene Nizzero, Lori Adams, Dave Hodge, Craig Hamilton, and GSWA Chair R. Denton is ex officio.

Scott reviewed points in the PPTX slide. After the disappointment of having first funding application declined, the AIS-EWM team is anxiously awaiting news of whether its second attempt (January 2019) for EcoAction funding will be successful. The proposed pilot study is called *Lake Aquatic Invasive Control in Sudbury* or LAICS. The Committee is very grateful to biologist Dr. Charles Ramcharan who has been instrumental to the project design. The application has made it to the next level of review but there is considerable competition for limited funds. Since a decision may not be made until late summer or fall, the Committee plans to meet to consider an alternative plan.

Important contacts have been made this year with provincial and local offices of MNRF; Dr. Eric Sager who oversees projects with coir and jute at Big Cedar Lake; Kawarthas Lakes Stewards Association; and CRE-Laurentide, a Quebec association that has excellent resources related to EWM. Chair Denton thanked the Committee members for the considerable time spent on the project proposal and funding application.

## DRINKING WATER PROTECTION COMMITTEE (DWP) - Chair, Richard Witham

Richard acknowledged members: David Young, Margaret McLaughlin, Lesley Flowers, John Lindsay, Lilly Noble. He gave some background on the Committee and explained it investigates ways and means of protecting drinking water quality in lakes and rivers, encourages regular septic system maintenance and repair, and explores the road salt issue. It organized the well-attended Septic Social May 3<sup>rd</sup>, contributed to the city's *Living With Ice* circular, and met with city staff about its Risk Management Report. CGS has a mitigation plan for road salt use and now intends to work with owners of large properties since they account for nearly 50% of overall salt use. There is concern about elevated NaCl levels in Ramsey Lake, a major drinking water source for Sudburians. The DWP developed a flyer *De-Icers & Traction Aids* comparing environmental impact and cost of ice melting products. (attached)

KINGSWAY ENTERTAINMENT DEVELOPMENT (KED) – John Lindsay.

Re the LPAT, the Ontario Divisional Court is deciding who can question witnesses. Decision may take 6 months. One developer may buy nearby hotel and attempt to get it re-zoned to use as a temporary casino.

- 8. <u>Treasurer's Report</u> (attached) David Young shared the GSWA Account Activity from March 19, 2018 to March 25, 2019 and provided the Summary of Yearly Revenues and Expenditures. Need to sell 287 tickets and obtain sponsorships, donations for silent auction. Updates reporting ticket sales will be emailed.
