- GSWA purchased Directors, Officers and Business Liability insurance from Cade Insurance Brokers for one year at a cost of \$891.

- Richard clarified that instead of sending a letter responding to the passing of Bill 197, GSWA focused on submissions designed to influence government policy before the legislation was passed.

4. Correspondence

Richard W. briefly reviewed the implication of Bill 197, Provincially Significant Wetlands, EAA Project List, Conservation Authorities and some related correspondence.

- b) Letter to Minister Clark regarding Minister Zoning Orders
- c) Letter to the Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs

KED Motion: John L shared with the GSWA Board a draft motion intended for City Council. The motion asks that Council reconsider the location of the Kingsway Entertainment Development (KED) to outside of the Ramsey Lake watershed. The Board voted to support the motion. Subsequent to this John had discussions with Councillors Cormier, Leduc and Vagnini about the wisdom of presenting the motion at this sensitive time. There was agreement that emphasis should be on the Ramsey Lake Sub-watershed Study and responses to it. The proposed motion will be put on hold and revisited when the RL study is presented to Council.

5. Treasurer's Report – Dave Young's report (attached) shows our bank balance to be \$12653.69. This includes the Trust Fund amount of \$414.67 that the Education Committee plans to access for the Troubled Waters event.

6. Committee Reports

<u>Education Committee</u>: **Troubled Waters Webinar Series** – Alex explained that the five original speakers for last spring's planned event agreed to present virtually for a webinar series. He reviewed the poster and details: 5 Thursdays from 7 – 8:30 p.m. beginning Feb. 4. GSWA is proud to partner with Vale Living with Lakes and with FOCA. Alex encouraged all members to attend and to help publicize the series. An email with the poster and registration link will be shared later this week. Some suggestions were received such as emphasising that the webinars are free; to add our event to Eventbrite; notify the City via their Community Initiatives Coordinator (e.g. CAN's); and to notify LU, college and high school science departments. Zoom Webinar will handle registrations and email reminders to participants.

Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS-EWM) – no update DWPC – no chair; no report Membership Committee – no update

7. Presentations – Amanda Hey

a) **Phosphorous and Chloride Levels in Nepahwin Lake** - Mandy continued her review of the findings of the CGS-commissioned Nepahwin Lake (Phosphorous) Causation Study and CGS water quality sampling. Nepahwin is hit hard by urban runoff. Her PPTX included maps showing the salted roads, large parking lots, and drainage discharge outlets, and charts illustrating elevated phosphorous and chloride levels. There is internal phosphorous loading in deeper sediments and a decline in dissolved oxygen concentrations levels at depth providing 'legacy' phosphorous in sediments that can continue to be released over time. Unlike Ramsey, Nepahwin does not have protection as a drinking water source and is vulnerable to ongoing salt loading from cross-sectorial road/parking lot/driveway salting practices. A framework to mitigate further salinization was shared. The link to the NLWS Causation Study is

- b) **Decision Guide** for winter salt use Mandy worked with Margaret and Richard W to update the GSWA's *De-Icers & Melting Aids* document. Data and a disclaimer have been added and the colourcoded document is re-titled *A Decision Aid for Common Residential Ice Melts and Traction Aids.* The guide is intended to educate consumers and vendors as to how we can have options that address safety and are environmentally friendly at the same time. While not part of the content of the Decision Aid, in gathering the product information at stores, it was noted the packages displayed terms (natural, organic etc.) and visuals (photos or icons) that were potentially misleading. Appreciation was expressed to Mandy and her team for developing this comprehensive document. A soft rollout is planned, starting with sharing it with our member stewardship groups.
- Discussion was held on suggestions about next steps GSWA might take towards mitigating the use of salt. Smart About Salt Council is an important resource.
- **ACTION**: A salt working group will be struck to explore options. An appeal will go out to our member groups for volunteers to serve. Those expressing interest at this time include Mandy, Norm, Margaret, Nicholas S, and Gisele.
- 8. The Chair asked everyone to consider serving on the GSWA Board or its committees. GSWA is in need of a social media coordinator, a francophone spokesperson and members wishing to serve as chair, vice-chair or as a director. Several terms end as of the March 2021 AGM, including Richard's term as chair. Nicholas offered to help with social media and will consider involvement on the Board.
